Prairie River Monument Re-dedication:

Local Civil War History:

Frank Dwight Baldwin, Major General, U.S.A. was one of our county's most decorated and colorful members of its Roll of Honor. The following excerpts were taken from *St. Joseph in Homespun* written by Sue Silliman in 1931 for the county centennial.

As a boy of eighteen, Frank Baldwin ran away from his home in Constantine to enter the service, and was promptly brought home. He ran away again, and was again brought home. On his third attempt he threatened to kill anyone who attempted to take him back, and his parents relented. When Company D of the 19th Michigan was organized he mustered in as first lieutenant on September 5, 1862.

He steadily rose in rank, brevetted for gallantry and cited for conspicuous bravery beyond the call of duty. As Captain of Company D at Peach Tree Creek, under heavy fire and ahead of his own men he singly entered the enemy's line captured two fully armed officers and their stand of regimental colors. For this action he received his first Medal of Honor.

After the war, he went on in service with the regular U.S. army as a lieutenant in the Indian wars. It was in that service he received his second Medal of Honor for the gallant rescue of white girls by voluntary attack on Indians who far outnumbered him.

He continued his service through the Philippine insurrection rising in rank to Major General and retiring from service on June 26, 1906. He died April 1923 and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Be sure to track down a copy of Sue Silliman's book for a full narrative of his exploits and a wealth of other local history.
