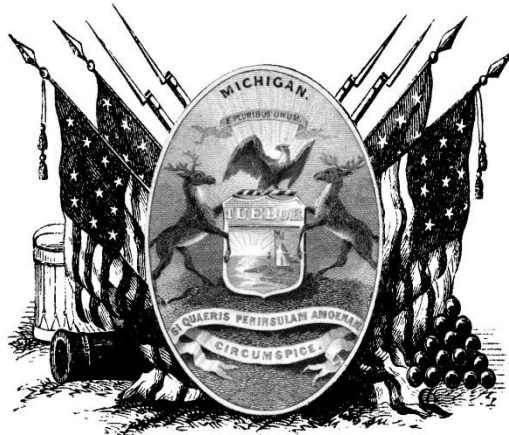

You can download this from the suvcw.org site under Governance & Forms. These are fill-in forms and National Headquarters demands that they be typed not handwritten or they will be rejected. Frankly, some of the handwriting I have witnessed would embarrass an ink covered worm.

Page 2 of Form 3 requests a photocopy of the applicant's Civil War ancestor's military or pension record. I have received a few Form 3 where this was neglected. It is necessary to complete the application and causes delay.

On page 4, in the case of Juniors, Have an adult initial the bottom line.

Payment: I have been sent payments that are all over the map. This costs time and postage for me and the Department Treasurer to send refunds. I post a spreadsheet at least twice a year showing the pro-rated amounts due. If you require a copy, email me at secretary@suvchwmi.org and I will supply you with one.

GENERAL ORLANDO M. POE CAMP 444

On 07 August 2026, the Brothers of General Orlando M. Poe Camp 444 lost Charter Member, Chaplain, and Council, Brother Calvin Murphy. The Brothers of Camp 444 mourn this tremendous loss to our Order and this country, and celebrate a life extraordinarily well-lived. Brother Murphy served in the United States Army from 1965-1967, serving in 1966-1967 in the Vietnam Conflict with Battery C, 1st Battalion, 44th Artillery out of Firebase JJ Carroll (Camp Carroll) on the DMZ. Brother Calvin's greatest service to his country was arguably that of the ultimate Veteran Advocate. He spent decades volunteering as an advocate for Veterans' and active

Military members' rights, supporting Gold Star and Blue Star Families, promoting the remembrance of POWs and MIAs (including establishing the annual POW-MIA event in Mt. Pleasant), honoring American Veterans from all eras from the American Revolution forward, and faithfully doing the work of and holding leadership roles within the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the SUVCW. There was no better friend or advocate for the American fighting-man and fighting-woman than Calvin C. Murphy, Jr.

From across the country and the state, family, friends, community members, and various Veterans groups (including Camp 444 Brothers) gathered at the Bethany Lutheran Church in Kaleva on Saturday, 22 August 2026 to pay tribute to Brother Murphy. It was

an amazing cross-section of America that attended, and showed the love and respect that Brother Calvin had with everyone that knew him.

Friday, 21 August 2026 several Brothers of Camp 444 traveled from their homes over to the sunrise coast for a historical learning experience at the Wurtsmith Air Museum on the grounds of the former Wurtsmith Air Force Base in Oscoda. The museum had many artifacts and exhibits on the history of

Remembering Brother Samuel Haskew Laswell

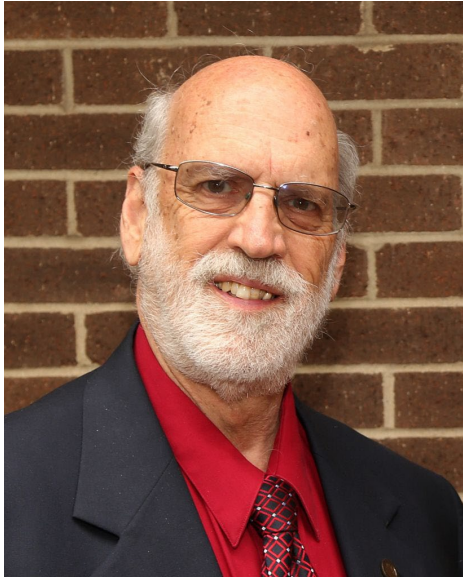
A Report on His Service, Activities, and Contributions to SUVCW Camp #427

Brothers,

It is with great sadness that we remember our Brother Samuel Haskew Laswell—known to all of us simply as Sam, who passed away on August 2, 2026, at the age of 83.

Sam was much more than a member of the Sons

of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Camp #427. He was our Camp Chaplain, a proud United States Air Force veteran, a man of strong faith, a Civil War enthusiast, a historian, and a friend to many of us. He was a familiar presence at our meetings, ceremonies, parades, and special events, and he consistently found ways to contribute to the Camp and share something he had learned.



A Faithful Chaplain and Brother

Sam's role as Camp Chaplain was one of his most important contributions. He regularly led our opening and closing prayers and provided chaplain services at meetings and special events. His prayers brought a sense of faith, reflection, and reverence to our gatherings and reminded us that our work of remembering those who came before us is also about service, fellowship, and respect.

His dedication was recognized at the national level when Sam received the National Chaplain's Award. This honor reflected the commitment and faithfulness he brought to his duties as Chaplain and was a source of pride for both Sam and Camp #427.

Sam also believed strongly in participating in the life of the Camp. He joined his Brothers at Memorial Day parades, Decoration Day observances, Flag Day programs, Victorian Tea events, Christmas gatherings, and other commemorative activities. He particularly enjoyed participating in the Dearborn Memorial Day Parade, including riding with the Camp in a Model A automobile.

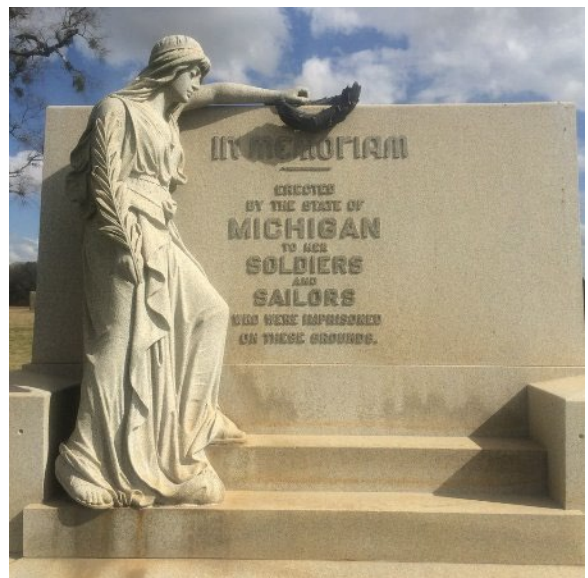

A Student and Teacher of History

Sam was an enthusiastic student of history and frequently shared articles, videos, presentations, and historical discoveries with the Camp. His interests covered much more than one particular aspect of the Civil War. He wanted to understand the people, places, battles, monuments, cemeteries, and events that made up our nation's history.

Among the subjects he brought to the Camp was the Michigan Monument at Andersonville Prison Camp, honoring Michigan soldiers who suffered and died there. He also followed the stories of Civil War soldiers buried far from Michigan, including seven Michigan Cavalry



soldiers buried at Fort Caspar Post Cemetery in Wyoming. Sam shared information about their graves and the cemetery's plans for improvements, as well as other Civil War graves in Wyoming connected to Michigan soldiers.

The Michigan monument, pictured on the previous page, is located on the prison site approximately 290 feet from the North Wall and about 90 feet behind the Massachusetts monument. It was dedicated on 30 May 1904.

Sam was also interested in Michigan's broader history. He shared information about the documentary *Frontier to Freedom: Wilderness, Revolution, and Michigan Statehood*, highlighting Michigan's role in the American Revolution and the development of the state. His willingness to share such information reflected his belief that our understanding of history should extend beyond the familiar stories.

The General Grant Home Presentation

One of Sam's memorable presentations was his April 8, 2025, presentation on the General Ulysses S. Grant Home in Galena, Illinois.

Using a collection of 1950s-era picture postcards, Sam discussed Grant's home and his return to Galena following the Civil War. He began with the famous image of Generals Ulysses S. Grant and Robert E. Lee at Appomattox Court House following Lee's surrender in 1865.

The presentation was typical of Sam. He took something as simple as a collection of old postcards and used it to open a larger conversation about the Civil War, its leaders, and the lives they lived after the fighting ended.

Genealogy, Veterans, and Military Service

Sam also looked for information that could benefit his fellow Brothers. He shared information about RootsTech genealogy programs, encouraging members interested in family history to take advantage of free educational opportunities.

His concern for veterans and military families was equally evident. Sam brought information to the Camp

about Mid-Michigan Honor Flight and the Freedom Centers at Detroit Metro Airport, believing these organizations provided meaningful ways to support veterans, active-duty military personnel, and their families.

These were not simply announcements from Sam. He wanted the information included in Camp minutes so that other Brothers could learn about the organizations and potentially become involved themselves.

Remembering Both Sides of the Civil War

Sam also had an interest in the Sons of Confederate Veterans and openly discussed his involvement with the organization. He recognized that the Civil War was a complicated and deeply personal part of American history and believed that the stories of those who served on both sides should be remembered.

Importantly, Sam never viewed this interest as a glorification of the conflict. He deeply regretted the death, suffering, and destruction that resulted when Americans fought and killed other Americans.

Sam often emphasized that the lessons of the Civil War should ultimately lead us toward peace and understanding rather than continued division. He believed that people could disagree about history, ancestry, or other differences and still find common ground and peace in one another.

That belief was especially meaningful coming from a man who spent so much time studying a war that divided the nation. For Sam, remembering history honestly did not mean remaining divided by it.

One of the last conversations: General John Bell Hood and the Final Battles

Sam was particularly interested in the final campaigns of the Civil War and the tragic story of General John Bell Hood and the Army of Tennessee.

Towards the end, he discussed the story of Hood's 1864 campaign through Spring Hill, Franklin, and

Nashville. At the Battle of Franklin on November 30, 1864, Hood ordered a disastrous frontal assault against heavily fortified Union positions. His army suffered more than 6,000 casualties, while 14 Confederate generals became casualties, including six killed or mortally wounded.

Among those lost was Major General Patrick Cleburne, one of the Confederacy's most respected commanders. Brigadier Generals John Adams, Hiram Granbury, States Rights Gist, Otho Strahl, and John Carter were also killed or mortally wounded.

Two weeks later, Hood's depleted army suffered a decisive defeat at Nashville, effectively destroying the Army of Tennessee as an effective fighting force.

For Sam, these battles represented more than military movements and casualty figures. They illustrated the terrible human cost of the Civil War and the loss experienced by Americans on both sides.

Sam, John Wayne, and the Movies

Sam was also a movie buff and had a particular fondness for John Wayne. His love of movies was not surprising given his work at the historic Redford Theatre, where he served as Head Maintenance Manager. He helped maintain the historic theater and played a behind-the-scenes role in preserving a piece of



Detroit's cinematic heritage.

John Wayne's Civil War-related films were naturally of particular interest to Sam. He especially enjoyed *The Horse Soldiers* (1959), in which Wayne portrayed a Union cavalry officer leading a raid through Confederate territory, and *The Undefeated* (1969), set in the aftermath of the Civil War and focusing on former Union and Confederate soldiers moving beyond the conflict.

Sam also enjoyed *Rio Lobo* (1970), Wayne's final film directed by Howard Hawks. Beginning during the Civil War, the story follows Union Colonel Cord McNally as he confronts betrayal by those who aided a Confederate train robbery. The film's themes of loyalty, honor, and betrayal appealed to Sam and reflected his own interest in the people and events surrounding the Civil War.

The theme of former enemies finding a way forward was particularly appropriate to Sam's own philosophy. He could enjoy the movies as entertainment while also appreciating the historical themes they presented.

Sam's work at the Redford Theatre and his interest in history shared something in common: preservation. Whether preserving a historic theater, researching Civil War soldiers, sharing old postcards, or remembering veterans, Sam believed the stories of the past were worth keeping alive.

A Man Who Shared What He Learned

Looking back over Sam's reports and activities, one thing becomes clear: he was always looking for something to share with his Brothers.

It might have been a forgotten Civil War soldier buried in Wyoming, the history of the Grant home in Galena, a Civil War monument, a genealogy resource, information about veterans' organizations, a historical documentary, a book, a video, or a story about one of the war's final battles.

Sam's reports were often an invitation: to learning, remembering, and sharing history.

His contribution to Camp #427 therefore cannot be measured by one presentation or one event. It was the accumulation of years of participation, prayer, research, fellowship, and service.

Sam's Final Legacy

Sam's passing leaves a space in Camp #427 that will not easily be filled. Yet the record of his service remains.

He leaves behind the prayers he offered, the history he shared, the presentations he prepared, the events he attended, the veterans he remembered, and the friendships he formed.

Brother Samuel Laswell will be remembered as a faithful Chaplain, recipient of the National Chaplain's

Award, a proud Air Force veteran, a historian, a keeper of memories, and a friend to his fellow Brothers.

Perhaps the most fitting way to remember Sam is through the prayers he offered so many times. Throughout his years with Camp #427, he opened and closed our meetings with prayer and reminded us of the importance of faith, service, fellowship, and remembering those who came before us.

Sam's Last Words of Prayer

His final words of prayer to our Camp are especially precious. They represent not only the words of our Chaplain, but the faith, compassion, and fellowship that Sam brought to his Brothers.

"Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

Those final words provide a fitting conclusion to the story of a man who spent so much of his life encouraging others, honoring veterans, preserving history, and bringing people together.

Sam understood that remembering the past should not keep us divided. Instead, it should teach us about sacrifice, remind us of the consequences of division, and encourage us to seek peace and understanding with one another.

As we continue the work of Camp #427, we will carry a part of Sam with us. When we gather for a meeting, stand at a cemetery to honor a veteran, participate in a parade or ceremony, discover the story of another forgotten soldier, or bow our heads in prayer, we will remember our Brother Sam.

May we honor his memory by continuing the work he cared so deeply about: remembering those who served, preserving their stories, supporting our veterans, strengthening our fellowship, and seeking peace and understanding despite our differences.

Communication in the Field

Morse code, invented in the early 1940's primarily for use by the railroads, was used extensively during the war by both sides. Lincoln is said to have spent time in the local telegraph office reading dispatches as they came over the wire from his field commanders. Telegraph communication was fast and relatively reliable. It was exploited by both sides, but not with impunity. Telegraph wires were routinely destroyed, messages were often intercepted, and misinformation was disseminated by both sides.



Press coverage of battles was facilitated and news from the home front was sent to the field. No doubt, morale was affected, both for good and for bad, by the messages that traversed the wires throughout the war.

The version of Morse code used during the war, known as American Morse or Railroad Morse, was somewhat slow and cumbersome, and not well suited to international use. It was later modified to become what we now refer to as International Morse Code.

The front page of this edition of Michigan's Messenger includes a message in the obsolete American Morse directly below the masthead. Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to translate the dots and dashes into the letters they represent.
